Selecting the Right Tree and Right Location for Planting

The right tree planted in the right place can add natural beauty to any landscape, but a tree in the wrong place can become expensive to maintain and even dangerous. When considering placement, select a planting location that will not interfere with utility lines both in the air and underground. Tree branches can interfere with overhead power lines, and roots can do the same with underground utilities. Many times trees and shrubs planted near power lines suffer either in appearance or vitality, but safety is the overriding issue. Trees conduct electricity and can create a safety hazard if limbs grow too close to electric lines.

Power outages or interruptions occur when trees and branches come into contact with overhead lines. Electrical arcing and sparking from a wire to a nearby branch can cause fires.


Tall growing trees with a mature height of greater than 40 feet should be planted at least 50 feet away from lines to avoid future pruning. A mature height of less than 25 feet is recommended if planting near lines. Keep in mind, trees should never be planted directly under power lines, near poles, or too close to electrical equipment.

Trees growing near power lines must be pruned to maintain a safe distance from the wires. If you have trees that are growing into power lines, contact your electric provider. Never try to prune them yourself.

Before the tree planting begins, make sure to call 811. The 811 "Call Before You Dig" campaign is a free service that locates and marks your public underground utilities. Make sure to call a few days in advance of any digging project to give ample time for a professional to locate these utilities. Electrical, gas, water, cable, and telephone lines can all be found beneath the earth.

Trees enhance the quality of life, keep in mind the environmental and energy-saving benefits of trees and bushes, but equally important, the need to choose the right tree when planting near power lines.

Hawaiian Roll Breakfast Sliders

1 1/2 pks Hawaiian Rolls 1 lb sliced deli ham 12 eggs, scrambled 12 slices American cheese 1/4 cup unsalted butter, melted 1/4 cup maple syrup

Preheat oven to 350 degrees and lightly grease 9x13 baking dish. Use a serrated knife to cut the rolls in half horizontally making sure to keep the top half of the rolls together.

In a medium size bowl whisk eggs until well blended. Pour eggs into a lightly greased skillet. Scramble eggs over medium-high heat until fully cooked. Add ham to rolls. Add an even layer of eggs over ham. Top with cheese slices and add the top half of the roll bun. In a small bowl, add butter and syrup. Microwave until melted. Spoon an even layer of butter and syrup mixture over rolls. Cover and bake for 10 minutes. Remove cover and bake an additional 10 minutes. Serve immediately.

This planting season, include energy efficiency in your landscaping plans. Adding shade trees around your home can reduce surrounding air temperatures as much as 6 degrees. To block heat from the sun, plant deciduous trees around the south side of your home. Deciduous trees provide excellent shade during the summer and lose

their leaves in the fall and winter months.
